

What does the bible say about god working in mysterious ways

An interesting press release hit my inbox this week, citing a recent survey by the Barna Research Group. As it turns out, many people don't know that some of their favorite biblical quotes aren't actually from the Bible. See how much you know—which of these famous phrases is found nowhere in scripture: "To thine own self be true." "God helps those who help themselves." "The truth will set you free." "God works in mysterious ways." As much as we at Mysterious Ways like that last one, the only phrase above that is in the good book is "the truth will set you free," in the Gospel of John. According to Barna's poll, only 24% of adults knew that. However, that doesn't make these other lines any less divinely inspired. Take the quote that inspired our magazine's title. While it wasn't written by God, the prophets, or the apostles, it does have divine origins. In our inaugural issue of Mysterious Ways, contributing editor Rosie Schaap told the story behind these well-known words: Late one stormy London night in 1763, a broken man was determined to end his life. He hired a coach to take him to the river. Only when he cast himself into the roiling Thames and drowned, he thought, would his agonizing trials finally end. He was unwavering in his resolve. He stepped down from the coach and walked through the fog toward the river's edge. When he reached the quays, he noticed a strange man sitting there, staring at him, as if on guard. Moreover, despite the rainfall, the tides were low—too low to drown a man. Returning home, the desperate man decided to poison himself with an overdose of laudanum, a potent drug derived from opium. But he couldn't raise the bottle to his lips. He tried again and again. Each time, it was as if an invisible hand were pushing it away. Finally, he tried to hang himself. The rope snapped, and his housekeeper rushed in, responding to the noise. The man gave up. For reasons he could not been the first time he had contemplated suicide, only to be held back by forces greater than himself. Four years after his dark evening in London, he sought a fresh start and moved to the village of Olney in Buckinghamshire. There, he met another man who had witnessed God's grace at a moment of great desperation. That man was John Newton, the celebrated Anglican preacher. Appointed to serve in Olney, Newton earned such a reputation for the power of his preaching and the depth of his convictions that people who desperately needed guidance and hope—like William Cowper—moved to town to benefit from his ministry. Cowper took residence in a house adjoining Newton's, and took a measure of peace in Newton's friendship and care. Newton understood that for the fragile poet's mind to find peace, writing would have to be part of the recovery. He encouraged Cowper to turn his creative talents to the composition of hymns, and the two collaborated on a collection of nearly 350 works known as the Olney Hymns. In the centuries since, countless people have similarly found comfort and spiritual sustenance in the hymns written by these two men. Newton, of course, is best known for his most famous work, "Amazing Grace," inspired by his miraculous rescue at sea. And Cowper? He composed a hymn titled "Light Shining Out of Darkness," about the hidden workings of the world that had prevented his suicide and led him, against all odds, to where he was meant to be. It begins with a line we all know well: God moves in a mysterious way. . . So don't feel too bad if you're one of those 76% who don't know their Bible inside out. There are many places in the Bible that tell stories of God's direction in someone's life that leads that person down a road they never thought they would tread. Sometimes God tells His people to do things that seem strange or even meaningless, but end up being a redemptive or victorious part of their story. This can be seen in Joshua 6:1-5 when God commands His people to march around the city of Jericho. Why would they need to march around it when they could just storm it and capture the city? Because Joshua and the children of Israel obeyed God's nature is how He turns situations and problems upside down to work for the good of His people (Romans 8:28). The Bible is full of stories of God astonishing His people when they realize how He had orchestrated situations in their lives. Desmond Tutu called God, "A God of Surprises." It is our role as believers to dwell in thanks and trust, even when our situations seem out of our control (especially when they seem out of our control). Psalm 147:5 states that God's understanding is beyond our measure, which means that we cannot possibly comprehend all the ways that He works throughout our lives. An excellent example of God's mysterious ways is exemplified in the life of Joseph. Joseph suffered isolation and pain when his brothers sold him into slavery. After Joseph endured extreme hardship and ended up in the palace, he told his brothers, "As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good plan for his life. Joseph's brothers were evil to him, but Joseph acknowledged that God desires to save His covenant people from the evil in this world (Genesis 15:13-14). Joseph brought the Hebrew people out of Canaan, where they experienced famine, and into Egypt (Genesis 43:1; 46:26-27). He was able to save his people because as governor of the land, he bought and sold the food (Genesis 42:6). Joseph was in Egypt because his brothers sold him into slavery. The people who sold their own brother into slavery were then dependent on him for nourishment (Genesis 37:28). Although this part of Joseph's story is remarkable, it is only a sliver of how God used Joseph's suffering and obedience to shape history. There would be no story of Moses or an exodus from Egypt four hundred years later if Joseph had not been governor of Egypt and lead his people from Canaan (Exodus 6:1-8). Would Joseph still have been able to save his family and be a catalyst for huge events in Hebrew history if he was not first a slave? Would he have had the influence in Egypt he did had he not first been falsely accused and jailed (Genesis 39:1-20)? We cannot say for sure. But we do know that Joseph's life displays God's glory and the surprising way that He turns our stories upside down for the sake of His exaltation. Through Joseph's story, we see that the Lord was with him, and opened the doors for Joseph to save his people. It is a joy to be a follower of Christ, because we are assured that God uses every event in our lives for His ultimate plan (Isaiah 46:10-11). If we walked by sight and not by faith our journeys would be very discouraging (2 Corinthians 5:7). As Christians we can trust that God's mysterious ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9).
